NORTH ARGENTINA 14 september to 16 october 2003

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A very nice and productive trip ; the country is actually very cheap, the most of the expanse is the car (Fiat Siena at <u>vpampin@milletrentacar.com.ar</u>, Hertz, 38 \in /day); the petrol is 0,54 \in per liter; we camped for the pleasure but the hosterias are cheap. Most of the national parks entrances and their campsites are free. The rangers were very welcoming in all the parks. 1 peso was around 0,31 euros. They don't accept USD (except in big hotels) ; Detailed map by regions are sold in the gas stations.

Total 8000 kilometers, 487 species seen (185 lifers) + 4 heard.

14/09- From the airport we drove to **RESERVA DE OTAMENDI** north of Buenos Aires. It is rather cold. From the highway the reserve is signposted. It was Sunday, end of afternoon, we just walked for one hour, and learnt that there is no hotel or camping closer than Campana. That's where we spent the night in the Hotel Plaza, 70 pesos.

15/09- Cloudy then sunny- At 8 am we were in the reserve and we went with a guide (compulsory) on the Laguna trail, 50 pesos for 4 hours ; it was very nice, marshes with some reeds and footbridges, at the end is a platform for a nice view on waterbirds.

In the afternoon we went out of the reserve, and followed the tarred road to the end at the railway station; there we crossed the rails and followed the untarred road for 2 kilometers, this is a site for the *Straight-billed Reedhaunter* whose favorite plant is the *eryngium* (the guide showed us in the morning which plant it is).But we failed, and we had no song recording. Amongst the birds seen : *White-tufted Grebe, White-necked Heron, Rufescent Tiger-Heron, Whistling Heron, Great and Snowy Egret, Maguari Stork, White-faced Ibis, Southern Screamer, Black-bellied Whistling-Duck, Coscoroba and Black-necked Swan, Silver Teal, Rosy-billed Pochard, Bay-winged Hawk, Snail Kite, Long-winged Harrier, White-winged and Red-fronted Coot, Bar-winged Cinclodes, Curvebilled Reedhaunter very responsive to tape, Yellow-throated Spinetail, Wren-like Rushbird, Freckled-breasted Thornbird, Rufous-capped Antshrike, Spectacled Tyrant, Many-colored Rush-Tyrant, Yellow-browed Tyrant, Tawny-headed and White-rumped Swallow, Rufous-browed Peppershrike, Black-and-rufous Warbling-Finch, Black-capped Warbling-Finch, Long-tailed Reed-Finch, Great Pampa-Finch, Hooded Siskin, Yellowwinged Blackbird ;*

Then we drove to CEIBAS where we arrived at 5:30 pm, we took a room at 25 pesos at the roadside restaurant on the left after the bridge, small but clean. We birded the road n°12 from the car, looking for the site of the *Straight-billed Reedhaunter* indicated in the Cotinga 10, but the description of the site and the point on their map are opposite. Anyway we saw some *Nacunda Nighthawks, Giant Wood-Rails, Narrow-billed Woodcreeper, Pied Water-Tyrant...* Many traffic.

16/09- Sunny- In early morning we took the untarred road in front of the hotel, passing through a village and then joining a good habitat of thornbushes and marshes : *Southern Screamer, Brazilian Duck, Bare-faced and White-faced Ibis, Yellow-throated, Stripe-crowned and Chotoy Spinetail, Short-billed Canastero, Brown Cacholote, Tufted Tit-Spinetail, Little Thornbird, White-tipped Plantcutter, White Monjita, Vermilion Flycatcher, White-rumped Swallow, Shiny and Bay-winged Cowbird, Brown-and-yellow Marshbird...*

We came back to the main road by the same way, but when we bought a detailled road map we saw that this road makes a circle and join the main road.

We missed the site at the north of GUALEGUAYCHU for the *Saffron-cowled Blackbird*, a problem of bad preparation, when we read later our trip reports it was too late;

At 11 am we drove to PARQUE NACIONAL EL PALMAR, 12 pesos the entrance, 4 pesos/pers for camping + 4 pesos for the tent. A beautiful landscape of palm trees. The campsite is situated along the Rio Paraguay with many trees. In the campsite and on the ruins trail : *Variable Antshrike, Golden-browed Warbler, Red-rumped Warbling-Finch, Ultramarine Grosbeak,...* We drove by night after dinner : *Scissor-tailed Nightjar, heard Tropical Screech Owl and Great Horned Owl.* + 1 five-banded Armadillo, 1 zorro, 1 Viscacha.

Night very cold.

17/09- Sunny- Sunrise at 6 am, birding to 1 pm : *Grey-necked + Giant Wood-Rail, Guira Cuckoo, Gilded Sapphire, Golden-breasted Woodpecker, Scimitar-billed Woodcreeper, Sooty-fronted Spinetail, Buff-browed Foliage-Gleaner, White-crested + Mottled-cheeked Tyrannulet, Blue-billed Black-Tyrant, Gray Monjita, Blue-and-white Swallow, Masked Gnatcatcher, House Wren, White-rimmed Warbler, Sayaca + Diademed + Hepatic Tanager, Saffron Yellow-Finch, Green-winged Saltator, Plush-crested Jay, Black-capped Warbling-Finch ...*

It took us 3:40 hours to join Mercedes, and 2:30 from Mercedes to Carlos Pellegrini in the RESERVA NATURAL IBERA on an untarred but rather good road with birds (Several Spotted Nothura). Surprising arrival on a dike and then on a noisy bridge. The campsite is on the left at the entrance of the village, the track is in front of a kiosk, but we missed it as it was dark. We slept at Hospedaje Guarani, 15 pesos;

18/09- Sunny- In early morning we went for a boat trip, the boats leave from the campsite, we paid 50 pesos for 2 hours. It is the only place where we saw the *Spot-flanked Gallinule*; the place is fantastic and when the guide stopped the motor we got very close to the birds and the animals, it's magic. We were at 3 meters of a female *Southern Screamer* hatching 4 eggs, and 2 other couples with youngs. We saw around 40 species, *Chestnut-capped Blackbird, Black-capped Donacobius, Solitary Sandpiper, Purple Gallinule, Pied-billed Grebe, Unicolored Blackbird...,* and a water dear and capybaras and caimans; we asked to the guide if he knew the *Saffron-cowled Blackbird (Tordo amarillo)* but he didn't.

After the trip we left Carlos Pellegrini on road 41 with many stops and then the road 40 on the right (both sandy); around the cross for a few kilometers we saw several *Strange-tailed Tyrant*. More and more this humid zone is being burnt and planted with pine trees. We found the road 40 better than the 41, *Black-and-White Monjita, Green + Ringed Kingfisher, American Golden Plover, Burrowing Owl, Savanna Hawk, Spotted Nothura...* All in all it took us 4:30 hours to join the tarred road 14 with all our stops.

We decided to go to the Wheatley's site SAN MARTIN (p65) to find the Plovercrest by road 14 to L.N. Alem, then left dir. Santa Ana, and right on Obera road. On his map is a campsite, but the shops and the campsite have disappeared, and we didn't find a place wich looked safe and good to put our tent ; we lost some time looking for a campsite further, and finally decided to go to Santa Ana. There we had to drive to the Rio Parana and found the desolated campsite LA BOCA with some difficulties, we paid 2 pesos (no toilets, no water);

19/09- Sunny- At 5:30 am we went birding the untarred road going to the campsite along the rio, with some good patches of forest wich looked like the forest around San Martin. We took a small trail going up inside the forest at 1,2 km from the campsite's entrance, and saw *Small-billed Tinamou, Saffron Toucanet, Spot-backed Antshrike, Short-tailed Antthrush, Fuscous Flycatcher...*

Then direction to PARQUE NACIONAL IGUAZU where we arrived at 3 pm. All our reports and our Lonely Planet had more than 2 years, and we expected to camp inside the park. We have been very disappointed when we arrived: we passed a tollgate at 30 pesos/pers (15 p the 2nd day, make the ticket stamped before leaving), and joined a very big car park; then we entered in what could be compared to an attraction park with

large concrete alleys; many shops, bars and restaurants, and a small train joining the different points to watch the falls. What about the national park? All is now very different from the map in Wheatley's book. The Macuco Trail is still accessible, beginning on the right at the first train station. The Yacaratia Trail is now a jeep road for the Safari Adventure jeeps taking the tourists to the boats; the forest here is different, taller than at Macuco, but hard to bird with the jeeps (a ranger saw us and told us to leave, but as it was not mentionned that you can't walk there we refused). We didn't see the other trail leading to El Timbo ranger station. The footbridges to the falls are fantastic, but they are crowded, it's worth it anyway as they are superb. The brazilian helicopters fly over the falls, noisy...

The worse : IMPOSSIBLE TO ENTER THE PARK BEFORE 8 AM (close at 7 pm)! The sunrise is at 6 am, so we asked to the rangers the permission to come earlier the next morning, they refused. They understand anyway the birdwatchers' problem and don't seem to agree with the park's transformations.

We left the park and headed to Puerto Iguazu at 12 km, in the good campsite El Viejo Americano, 15 pesos/pers (bungalows 40 pesos) with big trees and a trail in the background : *Dusky-legged Guan, Turquoise-fronted Parrot, Common Potoo, Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl, Semicollared Nighthawk, Pauraque, heard Ocellated Poorwill, Gray-fronted Dove, Boat-billed Flycatcher, Magpie + Green-headed Tanager, heard Solitary Tinamou*

20/09- Sunny- At 8 am we were at the tollgate (we birded the road before), lost some time talking again to the rangers and headed to Macuco Trail (already hot): *heard Brown Tinamou, seen Violet-capped Woodnymph, White-barred Piculet, Streaked Xenops, Surucua Trogon, Plain Antvireo, Bearded + Swallow-tailed Manakin, Purplish Jay, Sepia-capped + Sociable Flycatcher, Greyish Elaenia, Blue-naped Chlorophonia, Black-goggled + Black-throated + Sayaca Tanager, Blue Dacnis, Creamy-bellied Thrush, Black-throated Grosbeak,...*

21/09- Sunny- Birded the road to the park : *White-eyed Parakeet, Southern Lapwing, Crested Caracara, Squirrel Cuckoo, Smooth-billed Ani, Toco Toucan, Black-capped Donacobius, Swallow Tanager, Red-crested Finch.* At 8 pm at the tollgate again, we headed to the Yacuratia Trail before the rush of the jeeps around 9; *Slaty-breasted Wood-Rail, Pale-vented Pigeon, Scaly-headed Parrot, Ochre-breasted Piculet, Chestnut-eared Araçari, Ochre-breasted Foliage-Gleaner, Red-ruffed Fruitcrow, Yellow Tyrannulet, Chestnut-vented Conebill, Rufous-bellied Thrush, Saffron-billed Sparrow;*

We took the train to Garganta del Diablo, a hole in the falls joined by footbridge; in the cliff of the hole, plenty of *Great Dusky Swift*, along the footbridge *White-winged Swallow, Grey-breasted Martin*, and around the park in general *Blue-crowned Parrotlet*, *Rufous-crowned Motmot*, *Roadside Hawk, Red-breasted Toucan, Field Flicker, Longtailed Tyrant, Green-headed Tanager, Green-winged Saltator...*

22/09- Sunny-On the advice of the rangers, we left Iguazu and took the untarred road 101 on the left on the airport road (there is a police post at the corner); this road passes through the national park and it is a good birding all along. At 34,5 km, there is a ranger station at the limit of the park, and the rangers of Iguazu falls kindly called there with the radio and asked if we could camp at the station, they accepted(but said that they would be absent that night). We took our time for birding : *Plumbeous Kite, Grey-headed Kite, Pale-vented Pigeon, Blue Ground-Dove, White-eyed+Reddish-bellied Parakeet, Scaly-headed Parrot, Green-barred + Yellow-fronted Woodpecker, Sooty Swift, Surucua Trogon, Chestnut-eared + Spot-billed Araçari, Ochre-breasted Foliage-Gleaner, Long-tailed + Sepia-capped Flycatcher, Syristes...*

We crossed several rios, and taped the *Spotted Bamboowren* many times at the bamboo patches, whithout success. 500 meters before the ranger station is a river, where we got washed in the evening : *White-shouldered Fire-eye, Grey-rumped Swift, Greenish Tyrannulet*.

The ranger station was fenced, but there is a good green and hide ground behind where we put our tent. The station is the limit of the national park. A female *Pauraque* was hatching 2 eggs 3 meters from our tent.

After sunset we drove for some kilometers with stops, no owl or nightjar answer to the tape.

23/09- Sunny- In early morning after a short walk on the road – *Robust Woodpecker*, *Ochre-faced Tody-Flycatcher* - we took a small trail going in the forest near our tent, just on the left behind the ranger station. It was a very good birding : *Ruddy Quail-Dove, Pale-vented Pigeon, Reddish-bellied Parakeet, Squirrel Cuckoo, Lineated + Blond-crested Woodpecker, Chestnut-eared Araçari, Plain-brown Woodcreeper(with some monkeys), Streaked Xenops, Rufous-capped + Grey-bellied Spinetail, Bertoni's Antbird, Short-tailed Antthrush, Black-tailed Tityra, Swallow-tailed Manakin, Mottled-cheeked Tyrannulet, White-necked Thrush, Guira + Black-goggled + Ruby-crowned Tanager, Red-crowned Ant-Tanager, Blackish-blue Seedeater, among others.*

We met the ranger, he told us that the rain should come in the evening; it was better for us to leave as the road was untarred.

We followed the road 101 for 12 km until a roundabout and took right the way to Wanda and had 2 kilometers of tarred road. Then the tar stopped at the beginning of the signposted PARQUE PROVINCIAL URUGUA-I. The ranger's station is 8 km further; this elevated road should be good in the morning, but we had no time to bird it.

There is a campsite along the river at the station with only toilets; a very nice loop trail of 3,2 km long leaves from the campsite following the river with many bamboos, another one of 2,2 km leaving from the other side of the road.

24/09- Heavy rain- After a short birding with a *Black-throated Piping Guan* in the campsite we came back to the car and waited for a lull. After lunch we could go back on the trail along the river as the rain was lighter and then stopped. *Neotropic Cormorant*, Muscovy Duck, Plumbeous + Snail Kite, Rusty-margined Guan, Scaly-headed Parrot, Scale-throated Hermit, Black-throated + Surucua Trogon, Ringed Kingfisher, Rufouscapped Motmot, Chestnut-eared Araçari, Toco Toucan, Blond-crested + White-spotted + Robust Woodpecker, Olivaceous Woodcreeper, White-browed + Ochre-breasted Foliage-*Gleaner, Tufted+ Variable Antshrike, White-shouldered Fire-eye, Plain Antvireo, Rufous* Gnateater, Greenish Manakin, Variegated Flycatcher, Great Kiskadee, Euler's Flycatcher, Southern Antipit, Drab-breasted Pygmy-Tyrant, Ochre-breasted Tody-Flycatcher, Greybreasted Martin, Rough-winged Swallow, Plush-crested Jay, House Wren, Rufous-bellied + White-necked Thrush, Red-eyed Vireo, White-rimmed Warbler + Streamside + Golden-crowned Warbler, Tropical Parula, Masked Yellowthroat, Guira + Black-goggled + Ruby-crowned + White-lined + Sayaca + Fawn-breasted + Chestnut headed Tanager, Red-crowned Ant-Tanager, Red-crested Finch, Rufous-collared Sparrow, Red-rumped Cacique

We spent a second night here.

25/09- Clouds and thin rain- We birded the trail from the campsite again, and the Islas Malvinas trail on the other side of the road, where we saw another *Black-throated Piping Guan, Scale-throated Hermit, Large-headed Flatbill*.

Then we took the road to the Corrientes region, at 4.30 pm we passed by Ituzaingo on the road 12 after Posadas. The area looked good so we decided to sleep in Ituzaingo and bird the marshes in the morning. Camping La Barca, 10 pesos.

26/09- Sunny- At 6 am we drove on the road 12 and turned left on the rd 118, tarred; quickly we saw many birds in the marshes, *Black-crowned Night-Heron, Plumbeous Rail, Large-billed + Yellow-billed Tern, Yellowish + Hellmayr's Pipit, Grayish Saltator, Grassland Yellow-Finch, Rusty-collared Seedeater and many others.*

Then we turned right on the road 5, tarred, with marshes better than the previous one, absolutely full of birds : *Great Egret in large numbers, Roseate Spoonbill, American Woodstork, Jabiru, Spotted Crake, Crested Doradito, Unicolored Blackbird...*

Later we turn left on the sandy road 13 to reach the PARQUE NACIONAL MBURUCUYA, 53 km until the entrance. Good free campsite with toilets and showers behind the ranger station on the left of the road, after another office situated on the right side. In the camp, *Creamy-bellied Thrush, Plush-crested Jay, Brown-crested Flycatcher, White-lined + Orange-headed Tanager, Striped Owl singing and seen in early morning.*

We walked on the loop trail beginning in front of the station, passing through dry small palms area, going to a lagoon where we didn't see much, then reaching a nice forest where we saw the *Pale-crested Woodpecker*. A night walk gave us a nice view of a *Tropical Screech-Owl* and we saw 3 armadillos.

27/09- Sunny- In early morning we walked on the Yatay trail, beginning from the road on the left after the station, very nice too, passing through a forest, *Little Woodpecker*, *Green-backed + Crested Becard, Streaked Flycatcher, Great Antshrike, Rufous-crowned Peppershrike, Southern Beardless Tyrannulet, Golden-winged Cacique, + a small deer, then we arrived to an aera of grasses where we taped the <i>Lesser + Wedge-tailed Grassfinch*, with success, then we saw *Greater + Freckle-breasted Thornbird*. Then there were some trees with a family of howler monkeys, and we arrived to a platform facing the river with *Brazilian Duck, White-faced Whistling-Duck, Green Ibis, Roseate Spoonbill, Southern Screamer, Limpkin, Grey-headed Gull, Yellow-billed Tern, Yellow-throated Spinetail...*

We left the park on road 13, tarred after Mburucuya, and joined the road 16 to Corrientes, Resistencia, and decided to stop at the beautiful PARQUE NACIONAL EL CHACO for the night. We turned right on the road 9 after Lapachito to Capital Solari, from there it was 6 or 7 km of dirt road to the park; it took us 4 hours.

Free nice campsite with some trails that we decided to bird the next morning. We installed the tent and drove to a lagoon a few km from the campsite with a tower: *Cream-backed Woodpecker, Great Black Hawk, heard Ash-throated Crake* and a caïman.

In the campsite we saw a *Chaco Pygmy-Owl* that we identified by the call that we identified by that we identified by that w

28/09- A storm began in the night and it rained soon after; we packed the tent and decided to leave because we cared about the state of the dirt road, we should have stayed and bird the park! We quickly got stuck less than 1 km from the gate in this thick mud. We have been waiting in the car that the rain stops, hoping to see somebody with a 4x4 who could pull us to the tarred road; after 2 hours we saw a rider coming, as it was Sunday he said that the tractor of Capital Solari was unusable. We proposed to pay anybody who could help us, he came back later with a rope and attached it to the car; mounted the horse and pulled us with difficulties and we had to stop many often for the horse. But we have been saved, and he asked us 30 pesos, having no change and very relieved we gave him 50 pesos, surely he wouldn't expect so much money! During our wait we saw *Giant Wood-Rail, Great Rufous Woodcreeper, White Monjita, Vermilion Flycatcher, Lark-like Brushrunner, Crested Cardinal.*

We took the road with a car in a terrible state, impossible to make it wash in the gas stations on sundays. Around Rio Muerto the road 16 became very bad with many holes and it was very tiring; birds seen on the way : *White-banded Mockingbird, Blue-crowned Parakeet*.

We stopped for the night at Monte Quemado at Hotel 9 de Julio, 20 pesos. We took down the wheels to clear them of the dry mud.

29/09- Sunny-Leaving at 6 am to JV GONZALES, arrived at 8:30. We turned right just before the entrance on the dirt road 41. We found a trail on the right going inside the

chaco 15 km further, just in front of a house (school?), we began to walk, but suddenly met a large track; we first thought that they were making a road, but realised that all the area had been squared and was being distroyed. We felt very sad and depressed and used these large tracks for birding. It was good, and we birded until 1:30 pm, taping several birds : *Brushland Tinamou on the road drinking in a water hole as it rained here too the night before, Blue + Picui Ground Dove, Monk + Blue-crowned Parakeet, Turquoise-fronted Parrot, Burrowing Owl, Guira Cuckoo, Glittering-bellied Emerald, White-fronted Woodpecker, Narrow-billed Woodcreeper, Red-billed Scythebill, Chaco Earthcreeper, Crested Hornero, Stripe-crowned Spinetail, Lark-like Brushrunner, Great + Variable Antshrike, Crested Gallito, Pearly-vented Tody-Tyrant, White-crested Tyrannulet, Southern Scrub-Glycatcher, Greater Wagtail-Tyrant, White Monjita, Cinereous Tyrant, Crowned Slaty Flycatcher, Rufous-browed Peppershrike, Whitebanded Mockingbird, Masked Gnatcatcheer, Tropical Parula, Stripe-capped Sparrow, Red-crested Cardinal, Blue-and-yellow Tanager, Red-crested Finch, Great Pampa-Finch, Golden-billed + Greyish Saltator, Ultramarine Grosbeak, Bay-winged Cowbird...*

In JV Gonzales we slept at Hotel Colonial, 45 pesos.

In the evening had dinner in the chaco in the same trail than in the afternoon, we saw closely a *Little Nightjar*.

30/09- Sunny- In early morning we went back to road 41 until another trail, in fact a dirt road at 17 km that we found less good than the previous one. Some birds were similar, with anothers : *Tataupa Tinamou, King Vulture, Checkered Woodpecker, several Chaco Chachalaca, Scimitar-billed Woodcreeper, White-tipped Plantcutter, Small-billed + White-crested Eleania.* There was a strong wind; from the road on the way back, an *Aplomado Falcon*; we stopped again at km 15, very quiet (too windy), we followed the trail on the left alongside the road, *Bay-winged Hawk* but we stopped as it was very quiet.

At 1:30 pm we leave JV Gonzalez for 2 hours drive to PALOMITAS following road 16 then 34; it is very hot, we think that we took the right dirt road on the right side passed Palomitas village, crossing some chaco much drier than in JC Gonzales, no leaves at all in the thorbushes, but after some kilometers we joined a private property; we saw 4 *Buff-necked Ibis*; we followed the road passing in harvested fields, then met a jeep with the owner. We explained to him that we were looking for some Seriemas, he said that they were around in the field and permitted us to stay. A short time later we saw 2 Red-legged Seriema in a field. At 4 pm, as we saw nothing else in the area, we left for PARQUE NACIONAL CALIGUELA that we joined 2 hours later. We put up the tent, the campsite is free and has basic toilets and cold showers.

1/10- Sunny- From the station a road is going up on 21,7 km to the end of the park at 1700 m, then down to some villages; a ranger's house is at 17 km on the way up. The forest was very dry down and became greener on the way up. A beautiful forest. There are several trails, but only the Lagunita Trail (making a loop and finishing along the river at the station) is allowed without guide. We wanted to bird the Lagunita trail, indicated on the right of the road on the park's brochure. We walked on the road to reach it, it took some time : Golden-collared Macaw, Scaly-headed Parrot, White-bellied Hummingbird, Toco Toucan, Ocellated Piculet, Black-capped Antwren, Buff-browed Foliage-Gleaner, Streaked Xenops, Yellow-olive Flycatcher, Brown-crested Flycatcher, Sayaca + Orange-headed Tanager, Two-banded Warbler, Saffron-billed Sparrow, *Crested Oropendula;* after a while, arrived at the view point, we thought that we missed the trail as it looked close to the station on the brochure, we went back down, nothing, so we decided to take it by the other side, from the river behind the ranger's house. We followed some arrows, Turkey Vulture, Swallow-tailed + Plumbeous Kite, Great Black Hawk, Common Diuca-Finch, Red-tailed Comet, Black Phoebe, Sooty-fronted Spinetail, Southern Rough-winged Swallow, Chestnut-vented Conebill, we didn't find the Lagunita trail on the left which should go in the forest, and we walked and walked, it was hot and we went rather far in the river, we saw some pecaris and a grison, prints of tapir but few birds.

We came back around 3 pm, later we drove to the top of the road (we saw the Lagunita trail after the view point!) and had diner at the obelisk, *Slender-tailed Woodstar*. We didn't hear any *Red-faced Guan*. At 7:45 pm we taped the *Lyre-tailed Nightjar*, one answer lower on the road. We drove towards the sound, and we saw one flying in the headlights! It was at 800 meters from the obelisk. We stopped and taped it again, but it didn't come back. On the way back to the campsite, we didn't see more, made some stops but only heard we think a *Hoy's Screech-Owl* very far.

2/10- Sunny- We left the campsite at 4:40 am to the km 19 on the road for the *Red-faced Guan*, no success. *King Vulture White-rumped Hawk*, *Mitred Parakeet*, *Blue-capped Puffleg*, *White-bellied Hummingbird*, *Red-tailed Comet*, *Cream-backed Woodpecker*, *Azara's Spinetail*, *White-Throated Antpitta*, *Slaty Elaenia*, *Buff-banded*, *Tyrannulet*, *Greater Pewee*, *Highland Flycatcher*, *Brown-capped Redstart*, *Fulvous-winged Brush-Finch*, *Mountain Wren*, *Glossy-black Thrush*, *Fawn-breasted Tanager*, *Rusty-browed Warbling-Finch*, *Pale-legged Warbler*, *Golden-winged Cacique...*

In the end of afternoon, we walked on the Lagunita trail, a short walk down to a small lagoon, we saw *Least Grebe*, *Great Egret*, *Muscovy Duck*, *Gray-necked Wood-Rail*, *Southern Lapwing*, *Large-tailed-Dove*, *Dark-brown Swift*, *Narrow-billed Woodcreeper*, *Giant Antshrike*, *Rufous Casiornis*, *Ochre-faced Tody-Flycatcher*, *Yellow-olive Flycatcher*, *Plush-crested Jay*, *Blue-black Grassquit*... We taped the *Rufous Nightjar* from the campsite, one answered in the forest lower, we walked towards it and saw it.

3/10- overcast, few light rain for 1/2 hour- Lagunita trail again : *Green-cheeked Parakeet, Dot-fronted Woodpecker, Olivaceous Woodcreeper, Ocellated Piculet, Speckled + White-bellied Hummingbird, Blue-capped Puffleg, Red-tailed Comet, Slender-tailed Woodstar, Blue-crowned Trogon, Buff-browed Foliage-Gleaner, Ochre-cheeked Spinetail, Black-capped Antwren, Streaked Flycatcher, Red-eyed Vireo, Two-banded Warbler, Chestnut-vented Conebill, Sayaca, Tanager, Saffron-billed Sparrow...*

At 1 pm we left the park and drove two hours to the road of PARQUE PROVINCIAL YALA, easy to find after San Salvador de Jujuy on the Tilcara road. We stop as indicated in Wheatley's along the rio Yala : *1 couple of Torrent Duck, 1 couple of Rufous-throated Dipper picking some moss for their nest.* We followed the road, *Chiguanco Thrush, Yellow-browed Tyrant*; at Laguna Rodeo, few birds, we don't like the place and continue the road, to Laguna Comedora or a thing like that : *Neotropic Cormorant, Speackled Teal, White-winged Coot, South American Stilt, Andean Lapwing*; no place for camping, we followed the road and arrived to a bridge. Just before the bridge in the bent we took a small track on the left side with the car leading to some fields and the river. We put up the tent, it is very quiet, no traffic, just a house in front of us in the other side of the road (we are at 1900 meters high). From this bridge we saw a *Rufous-throated Dipper*;

At this time of our trip, we realised that we had not enough time to visit all the sites we wanted to. (Finally we had, avoiding the trip of 12/10). We decided to give up the visit of Huamaca and La Quiaca and Los Pozuelos, as we saw most of the specialities in Bolivia.

4/10- Sunny then heavy rain- Before sunrise we heard a *Hoy's Screech-Owl*, we quickly got up and taped it, it came very close in a tree close to the tent. After sunrise we hear the *Red-faced Guan*, we went towards the calls on the road, we saw four of them on the hill on the right at the right bent, very good!

We packed the tent, and continued the road towards Termas de Reyes, *Rufous-thighed Hawk, Andean + Rufous-webbed Tyrant, Andean Black Tyrant, White-throated Tyrannulet, Fulvous-headed Brush-Finch, Rufous-browed Warbling-Finch...* along the road, then the road slightly goes down, at 10 am we stop at a picnic area on the left

overhanging the Termas de Reyes, from there we saw *Andean Condor, White-collared Swift, Red-tailed Comet*; the hotel was open, and is a good base if you don't camp. Then the road is tarred again, and join the Jujuy-Tilcara road.

From San Salvador de Jujuy we headed to Salta, and stopped at EL CARMEN reservoir, Dique La Cienaga on the left side of the road, *Neotropic Cormorant, Brazilian Duck, Yellow-billed Pintail, Cinnamon Teal, Black-bellied + White-faced Whistling-Duck, White-faced Ibis, South American Stilt, White-winged Coot,...* after this reservoir, there is another one taking on the left at the fork, and following the road to a dike; a gravel road goes round it, lined with some forest wich looked good. We followed it in the heat of the day : Grey-necked Wood-Rail, Crested Caracara, Roadside Hawk, Dot-fronted *Woodpecker, Ringed Kingfisher, Black Phoebe, Masked Gnatcatcher, Rufous-collared Sparrow, Rufous-browed Warbling-Finch, Red-crested Finch, Ultramarine Grosbeak, heard Tataupa Tinamou and Red-legged Seriema*;

Then we took the narrow road to Salta passing at ABRA SANTA LAURA (LAURA PASS), at 14 km from the reservoir and 48 km from Salta, in a very nice yungas forest. We stopped at the pass and began to bird, but the weather became threatening and it began to rain. As we were closer to the reservoir we decided to go back there, when we arrived the rain became incredibly strong with very big hailstones. Just in front of the reservoir is the Pequeña Hospedaje hold by very nice people, we slept here, 35 pesos, and had a good diner.

5/10- Sunny- In early morning we stopped at Abra Santa Laura and birded from the road : *Scaly-headed Parrot, Mitred Parakeet, Golden-olive woodpecker, Olivaceous Woodcreeper, Stripe-crowned Spinetail, White-browed Foliage-Gleaner, Euler's Flycatcher, House Wren, Rufous-bellied Thrush, Two-banded Warbler, Brown-capped Redstart, Common Bush-Tanager, Sayaca + Fawn-breasted Tanager, Saffron-billed Sparrow, Stripe-headed Brushfinch, Rufous-collared Sparrow, Rusty-browed Warbling-Finch, Golden-winged cacique, Golden-billed Saltator, a good birding although nothing new. We taped without succes the <i>Spot-backed Puffbird* and dispaired of finding the endemic *Yellow-striped Brush-Finch*.

We drove down towards Salta, there was no more forest, we saw a big lagoon on the left : *Snail Kite, Fulvous Whistling-Duck, Southern American Stilt, Wattled Jacana, Scaly-headed Parrot, Burrowing Owl, Rufous Hornero, Wite Monjita, Fork-tailed Flycatcheer, Chiganco Thrush...*

After Salta we took the road 68 then turned right on road 33 to Cachi (SALTA-CACHI ROAD). It was 11:30 am; the road began with a nice gorge, then a nice area of cactus. We stopped at the entrance of a hamlet called San Martin, and followed a small trail longing a small stream : Chestnut (Steinbach's) Canastero, Great Horned Owl sitted on a branch, Golden-breasted Woodcreeper. No Rufous-bellied Saltator, but we know it already from Bolivia. We drove up to 3200 m, beautiful but very windy; nice colors of green an orange; on the way down we passed through the PARQUE NACIONAL LOS CARDONES, and a beautiful flat zone with big cactus; the road is suddenly tarred until Cachi, we saw some houses with a sign Agua de los Loros (we stopped and waited in vain for a while at a small waterhole for the *Burrowing Parrot*); arrived at the nice indian village of Cachi we slept at the municipal campsite, 5 pesos. Birds seen all along this road : Red-backed Hawk, Mountain + Chimango Caracara, Picui Ground-Dove, Great Horned Owl, Ashy-tailed +Andean Swift, Sparkling Violetear, Giant Hummingbird, Andean Hillstar, Red-tailed Comet, Golden-breasted Woospecker, Rufous-banded Miner, Rock Earthcreeper, White-winged + Bar-winged Cinclodes, Cinereous Ground-Tyrant, White-winged Black-Tyrant, Cliff Flycatcher, Blue-and-white Swallow, House Wren, Sayaca Tanager, Golden-billed Saltator, Plain-colored Seedeater, Gray-hooded + Bandtailed + Plumbeous + Mourning Sierra-Finch, Rufous-collared Sparrow, Common Diuca-Finch.

6/10- Sunny- In early morning we went back to the area of Agua de los Loros and a little upper, first because we really liked this landscape, and hoping to find the *Burrowing Parrot* or the *Sandy Gallito* –in vain- then we looked for the Gallito in the scrubs around Cachi, no success. We took the direction of Cayafate (CACHI-CAFAYATE ROAD) on a dusty road, no more cactus but a wonder of geological erosion; it is a long way, 130 km, very windy. We saw the *White-throated Cacholote* at km 1160, and then many flocks of *Burrowing Parrots* approching to Cayafate, and even after. Others seen along the road : *Chimango + Crested Caracara, Cream-breasted Canastero, Tufted Tit-Tyrant, Plain-mantled Tit-Spinetail, Rufous-sided Warbling-Finch, Ash-breasted + Mourning Sierra-Finch, Patagonian Mockingbird, Common Diuca-Finch...*

In Cafayate we camped at camping Luz y Fuerza, 6 pesos, dirty showers.

7/10- Sunny- We followed the road 40 and turned right on the road of the RUINAS DE QUILMES where the *Sandy Gallito* occurs, but we saw only *Plain-mantled Tit-Spinetail* and *White-throated Cacholote* amongst others. We took the road 307 to TAFFI DEL VALLE passing by a locality called EL INFERNILLO at the top of the road. On the road we saw *Short-tailed Hawk, Grey-hooded Parakeet, Andean Flicker, Greater Yellow-Finch...* After the road went down, the km are marked, we stopped at km 80 at a vegetated river gully. *White-throated Hawk, several Bare-eyed Ground-Dove, Band-tailed Sierra-Finch, Blue-and-white Swallow, Black-billed Shrike-Tyrant, Puna Canastero..*

At Taffi del Valle, we camped at the only campsite that we saw, noisy because of the dogs, 8 pesos. In the center there is a internet office, and a good small minimercado (Donia). Between El Infernillo and Tafi del Valle we saw on the left some bungalows wich seemed good, it can be a good base.

8/10- Sunny- We went backed up to the km 80 (*Speackled Teal* on the way in a pond), the *Bare-eyed Ground-Dove* were still here. As it was not easy to walk in the gully + problem of knee, we decided to follow the river from the edge on the left side, with the telescope, joining further the gully of km 78, and walked on the road the 2 km to the car. Slowly, it took us around 6 hours, *Ornate Tinamou, Andean Condor, Cinereous Harrier, White-throated + Red-backed Hawk, Blue-winged Ground-Dove, Gray-hooded Parakeet, Andean Swift, Andean Flicker, White-winged Cinclodes, Puna Canastero, Black-billed Shryke-Tyrant, Tucuman Mountain-Finch, Rufous-naped + Cinnamon-bellied Ground-Tyrant in the cultivated fields, Hooded Siskin; At km 78 along the road is a track, (we could have camped there), and 2 <i>Tucuman Mountain-Finch* were just at the beginning.

Then we drove up to El Infernillo in the afternoon, few birds but 2 *Buff-breasted Earthcreeper* on the roadside near the summit, a crushed *Great Horned Owl*, several *Burrowing Owl* all along the road.

9/10- Light rain during the night, and at sunrise, foggy in altitude. We wanted to bird the summit again, but it was too foggy; we followed the road 307 to Monteros and stopped at el Puente del RIO LA SOSA signposted, we easily found several *White-browed Tapaculo, Plain Xenops, Bar-winged Cinclodes, Mountain Wren, Brown-capped Redstart, Common Bush-Tanager, Yellow-striped Brush-Finch.*

We returned as the weather was better to El Infernillo, nothing new, we packed the tent and left at 11:30 pm, direction SALINAS GRANDES, taking roads to Simoca, then 157, 64, and 24 until the beginning of the dirt road to Puente Saladillo and Los Telares. We arrived at 6 pm in this area of dry salted marshes. It was very windy and as it was late we put up our tent at 200 meters from the tarred road in case of rain and had a beautiful sky with a full moon. We hoped to look for the *Salinas Monjitas* the next morning. At 4 am the wind was really very strong, and we saw some flashes of lightning, so we quickly packed and went on the tarred road to finish our night. **10/10-** Rain then cloudy. As it was raining lightly at 7 am, we decided to give up the Monjitas' research. We headed on road 9 and turned right on the road to Dean Funes, Cruz del Eje then road 38, stopping at CAPILLA DEL MONTE and LA CUMBRE. It was rather cold. At Capilla deL Monte we stopped at a El 44, a resort wich looked closed for work, from the outside we saw *Many-colored Chaco-Finch, Lark-like Brushrunner*; between Capilla del Monte we took a dirt road on the right leading down to the river, we followed it for a while and walked during one hour in a beautiful area of secondary houses along the river with some birds although not new : *Striated Heron, Speckled Teal, Plumbeous Rail, Spot-winged Pigeon, Monk Parakeet, Golden-breasted Woodpecker, Great Kiskadee, Brown Cacholote, Subtropical Doradito, White-bellied Tyrannulet, White-crested Elaenia, Hose Wren Wite-banded Mockingbird, Creamy-bellied Thrush, Blue-and-yellow Tanager, Golden-billed + Greyish Saltator, Black-and-rufous Warbling-Finch, Hooded Siskin, Bay-winged Cowbird..*

We probably should have stayed at La Cumbre and bird the chaco around the Cruz, but we were very tired and we were disappointed by the place, the chaco on the road before Capilla del Monte looked much better. We headed to Villa Carlos Paz, birding a lagoon on the right after La Cumbre : *Great + White-tufted + Pied-billed Grebe*, *White-winged Coot*. It is a very touristic and inhabited road and we regretted the quiet parks.

At Villa Carloz Paz, we slept at Camping Los Gitanos, very good showers, 11 pesos, it was very cold!

11/10- Sunny- At 6:15 am we left for ICHO CRUZ. It has completely changed since Wheatley's book, it has been built all along the river. We couln't find the trail along the river, and drove along it till the next village Cuesta Blanca, in fact the 2 villages are joined now by houses. At the end of the road along the right riverside, we stopped and took a trail in the chaco. It is very nice and but we didn't see much.

At 11 am, we drove to EL CONDOR on the very nice road 20, in a region called PAMPA DE ACHALA; at the parador on the left, we turned right on a dirt road, and stopped at an old abandonned restaurant, a pair of *Olrog's Cinclodes* and one of *Sierran Cinclodes* were there, and seemed to nest in holes of the ruins. Two *Long-tailed Meadowlark* were there too.

A little bit further on the road we saw a *Black-chested Buzzard-Eagle* at the top of an aerial. From there it was prohibited to enter.

On the way back (*Andean Condor*) to Icho Cruz we took the loop road of La Copina, *Short-billed Pipit*.

Back at Icho Cruz we birded the chaco on the right side of the road, as all is fenced we parked at a big sign for a dietetic restaurant and walked in the property, hoping to see the endemic *Cinnamon Warbling-Finch*. We saw *Masked Gnatcatcher*, *White-banded Mockingbird*, *Black-capped Warbling-Finch*, *Many-colored Chaco-Finch*, *Ringed Warbling-Finch*.

We camped at Red Beans Beach Campsite along the river, 20 pesos with breakfast, quiet.

12/10- Sunny- We birded the chaco again for the endemic, in vain, it was much better than the evening : *Picui Ground-Dove, Southern-crested + Chimango Caracara, Monk Parakeet, Field Flicker, Scimitar-billed Woodcreeper, Stripe-crowned Spinetail, Short-billed Canastero, Tufted Tit-Spinetail, Brown Cacholote, White-tipped Plantcutter, Great Kiskadee, Vermilion Flycatcher, Cattle Tyrant, White-crested Tyrannulet, Small-billed Elaenia, Tawny-headed Swallow, House Wren, Chald-browed Mockingbird, Creamy-bellied Thrush, Blue-and-Yellow Tanager, Golden-billed Saltator, Saffron Yellow-Finch, Stripe-capped + Rufous-collared Sparrow, Hooded Siskin, Bay-winged+Shiny Cowbird;*

At 10:30 am, it was quiet and we left Icho Cruz to the Entre Rios province by road 19 to Santa Fe, Parana and Diamante, where we headed to PARQUE NACIONAL PRE-DELTA where we expected to find some Seedeaters. We arrived after a long drive at 5pm; it was Sunday and the Monday was a public holiday, so many fishermen were here, but they all left and we camped alone -toilet + showers- In the evening 3 *Black Skimmer* flew above, some *Red-crested + Yellow-billed Cardinal* and *Common Miner* in the camp.

13/10- Sunny- We left the park direction Victoria–Gualeguay-Ceibas, where we made some stops at the different sites described in the Cotinga 10 for the *Straight-billed Reedhaunter*, nothing. The road 45 is nice but he was not there. We camped 7 km before the end of this road joining the highway. We don't remember the name of the campsite, along the river, 8 pesos.

14/10- Sunny- After a puncture repair, we headed to **RESERVA DE OTAMENDI** again, passed the reserve and went straight to the dirt road after the railway station. We found a pair of *Straight-billed Reedhaunter* in a nest in an eryngium plant, about 400 m from the railway on the right side, after the first trees bordering the road. A *Sulphur-birded Spinetail* came when we taped it.

After crossing Buenos Aires (we missed the accesso oeste), we headed to SAN CLEMENTE DEL TUYU by roads 36 and 11. We birded PUNTA RASA in the evening, following the indications for Bahia Aventura, at a fork the reserve is signposted, the road leading to a very large beach full of birds : *White-chinned Petrel, American Oystercatcher, Hudsonian Godwit, Red Knot, Snowy-crowned Tern.*

We camped in the very good ACA campsite, reserve normally for the club members, but as it was empty the accepted us. 26 pesos, but it's worth it and it was a good place for packing our bags the last day.

15/10- Sunny- We birded Punta Rasa reserve again, in the pampas and marshes : White-faced Ibis, Southern Lapwing, Black Skimmer, Brown-crested Martin, Yellowbrowed Tyrant, Great Kiskadee, Warbling Doradito, White-rumped Swallow, Correndera Pipit, Bay-capped Wren-Spinetail (numerous but hard to see), Saffron Yellow-Finch, Black-and-rufous Warbling-Finch, Long-tailed Reed-Finch, Great Pampa-Finch, Yellowrumped Marsbird..

On the beach : Magnificent Frigatebird, Neotropic Cormorant, Chilean Flamingo, Coscoroba Swan, South American Stilt, American Golden Plover, Semipalmated Plover, Greater Yellowlegs, Ruddy Turnstone, White-rumped Sandpiper, Snowy Sheathbill, Kelp + Brown-hooded Gull, Common + Cayenne + Royal Tern.

On the road of Bahia Aventura we saw *Golden-breasted Woodpecker*, *White-throated Hummingbird*, *Hudson's Canastero;*

Then we drove to the road 11, birding between km 280 and 290, and the track leading to the Reserva Campos del Tuyu wich is between km 298 and 299; there was a locked door that we passed over, the reserve is 10 km further, 2 hours later a angry man arrived and said that we had to ask for him at the village of Lavalle, we apologized and it was OK, but he didn't suggest to take us there, it was a bit late anyway. From this track we saw *Southern Wigeon, Chilean Flamingo, Correndera Pipit, Firewood Gatherer at around 1,5 km in the trees, Hudsonian Canastero and many others*.

From the road *Greater Rhea*, *Long-winged Harrier*, *Southern Lapwing*, *Red-garterer Coot*, *Guira Cuckoo*, *Field Flicker*, *Rufous Hornero*, *Lesser Yellowlegs*, *Plumbeous Rail*, *Scarlet-headed Blackbird*, ... *Barn Owl* crushed on the road.

On the beach of San Clemente Olrog's Gull;

The road along the canal 2 looked good too, but we didn't find the *Striped-backed Bittern* as other birdwatchers.

16/10- We left San Clemente by road 11, 63 then 2, to the airport; you always have to follow the highway until the indication 9 de Mayo wich leads west to the airport, it is a rather long way.

Next trip: 25/01/2004 to south Argentina.
